COMMITTEES

The following paragraphs are thumbnail sketches of the activities of our various committees and groups. While one person may already be credited for performing a certain task, we encourage interested parties to inform of their desire to serve – as people may welcome assistance to or relief from their service.

Evangelism - vacant, Chairman

The Evangelism Committee strives to make the most of opportunities to seek the lost and to proclaim the gospel in and around the Novi community. We usually focus on these events:

- > Easter Services & Breakfast
- > Church Picnic, the 4th Sunday of June
- > Restart of Sunday School / Adult Bible Class Church
- > Christmas Eve & Christmas Day services

Our committee reaches out to the community through advertising in the newspaper and cable, by blanketing postcards for Easter and Christmas, and by sending welcome cards to new movers. We also strive to follow-up on all visitors to our services, inviting guests to return and to continue to grow in the grace of Christ. If you have an interest in these or other evangelism opportunities, please contact the Evangelism Committee Chairman.

Our intention is to make our web page a resource both for our members and for "surfers" seeking the comfort which comes alone through Jesus. Properties – Russ McClelland, Chairman (248) 924-1142 The Properties Committee seeks to keep the church, grounds, and parsonage in good order so that our community may see that we have great honor for the God whose house this is. The Properties Chairmen welcome any assistance in the maintenance of and repairs to the church property.

Lawn Cutting Crew – Each summer, the lawn needs to be mowed, roughly once a week. A sign-up sheet is posted in April/May for volunteers to take a turn in cutting the lawn.

Church Cleaning – Each communicant member/family takes a turn cleaning a portion of the church – the Chapel, the Fellowship Hall, or the Bathrooms, Hallway, and Office. Each member is usually called on about two times a year. Instructions for cleaning are posted on the bulletin board. Please call the church office before coming to be sure that the church will be unlocked when you come in to clean.

Stewardship – Joel Trim, Chairman (616) 828-9373 The Stewardship Committee encourages all members of Good Shepherd to use their time, talents, and treasures to the glory of God in all things. In order to keep our congregation close knit, we also schedule various outings throughout the year where we can get to know one another on a more informal basis (cf calendar for a schedule of events). With our Mentor Program we strive to make new members feel more at home and to get them active in the congregation more quickly.

The Elders are responsible for the oversight of the teaching and practice of the Word and Sacraments at Good Shepherd, as well as the members' faithfulness to it. We encourage all members to be "our brother's keeper," expressing our concern for the souls of one another – particularly if we notice a member's absence from God's house. A phone call, made out of love and concern, is encouraged.

Altar Guild – Each month, two ladies take care of the paraments on the altar, tend the candles, and set up and remove the sacred vessels for Holy Communion. Carolyn Hoener (734) 495-1012 oversees the Altar Guild. All ladies are welcome to volunteer for a month of service.

Usher Teams – All confirmed men are welcome to serve as ushers. Usher teams serve for a month at a time, three times a year. The duties of the ushers can be explained by the elders or usher captains.

Music – Whether instrumental or choral, we strive to give God our best in our worship services. If you have a talent in music, please speak with Pastor Schroeder or Jeanette Schneider, our organist and choir director, about using your gifts to glorify God and to assist the proclamation of his gospel message through music.

LWMS – The Lutheran Women's Missionary Society, consisting of women from southeast Michigan, meets twice a year to hear about the mission work we support as well as the work with various projects. Laura Schroeder is the contact person for Good Shepherd.

Church Librarian — Our library works with a self-serve signout sheet. It does, however, still require a little bit of maintenance and straightening. Occasionally, members who have checked out books need to be contacted about their return. If you are interested in being the church librarian, please speak with the pastor.

Ladies Society – Our Ladies Society meets the first Thursday of every month and is open to all women of Good Shepherd. Friends are always welcome. The Ladies Society strives to give women opportunities to serve in various capacities. They also plan several social outings for the women each year. STEWARDSHIP A FAITHFUL RESPONSE TO A FAITHFUL GOD

This page is a personal Bible study about the giving of offerings to church. While it does not cover every aspect of Stewardship, its purpose is to get each of us to give careful and prayerful consideration to the offerings we give to church.

What does God expect of me/my family concerning my/our offerings?

On the first day of the week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income. 1 Corinthians 16:2

Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion for God loves a cheerful giver. 2 Corinthians 9:7

Honor the Lord with your wealth, with the firstfruits of your crops. Proverbs 3:9

"Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." – 2 Corinthians 9:7 This Bible study is intended to guide each member to decide in his/her heart what he/she wants to give to the Lord for a regular (weekly, in this study) offering. The Lord encourages us to be generous and with offerings-promising that he will always care for our daily needs (Matthew 6:25-34), and promising that he will bless us generously for taking him at his word. (Malachi 3:6-12)

Following the Lord's encouragement, we will give our firstfruits to the Lord. We will support the ministry of the gospel with regular offerings. We will give offerings in keeping with our income, or, proportionally.

I.	What amount have I/my family been giving on a weekly basis?

NOTE	There will be other opportunities presented throughout the year to further glorify God with our offerings. We do not desire to pressure people into giving when these opportunities presented. While some people might have their hearts set on one particular type of ministry (e.g., Hispanic mission work in Detroit) others may be more inclined to support other ministries (e.g. Committee on Relief, HVL, etc.) Our desire is to present a variety of ministries to support, letting members choose for themselves how they might support a specific ministry with a special offering.
NOTE	Any offering that is given toward a specific line item in Good Shepherd's budget will be applied to our budget. Once we exceed our budgeted goal for that year, then any offerings given toward that item will be over and above our budgeted amount. For example, Good Shepherd has budgeted \$5,000 for the HVL mortgage. Any offerings given to the HVL mortgage will be applied to that \$5,000 amount. If more than \$5,000 is given specifically to the HVL mortgage, then we will send the \$5,000 plus the additional gifts. If, however, an offering is designated for WELS Committee on Relief (CoR), all of that offering will go to WELS CoR since we have not included WELS CoR in our budget. If you have any questions about the way we designate our offerings, please speak to Church Council president, Dan Rauchholz, or with Pastor Schroeder.

SPECIAL NEEDS AT SPECIAL TIMES

Times arise in the lives of God's people which have special meaning in relationship to the church. Whether these are times of joy or sorrow, celebration or stress, you are encouraged to make use of the services of your congregation and of your synod.

BIRTH & BAPTISM

Please notify the pastor at the time of a child's birth so that he and the congregation may rejoice with you on this special occasion and offer a prayer of thanksgiving to God. Our Lord delights to include little children in his covenant of grace. Since he has given us the sacrament of Holy Baptism as the means by which he applies this covenant to little children, please arrange to have your child baptized shortly after the birth of your child. Just as the Holy Spirit gives new birth through the gospel, the Holy Spirit sustains that life through baptism. Therefore, you will want to faithfully nourish your child's faith through the gospel – both at home and at church. The pastor will consult with the parents regarding baptism and sponsors (i.e., godparents) when he visits with the new parents, either in the hospital or at home.





PLANNING A WEDDING, PREPARING FOR MARRIAGE

Please notify the pastor well in advance of your intended wedding date. He will want to meet with the engaged couple several times prior to the wedding in order to discuss God's plans and intentions for marriage. He will also offer guidance in the planning of the wedding ceremony. Couples are reminded that the marriage ceremony is not a wedding in which there happens to be elements of worship, but rather a divine service in which there happens to be marriage vows. Therefore, the wedding ceremony is a divine service in which God comes to bless us all, particularly the couple who will be vowing life-long faithfulness to each other. Everything in conjunction with weddings at Good Shepherd (e.g., dress, music, decorum, worship leaders, musicians and/or soloists, photography, etc...) will keep its emphasis on Christ and his gospel rather than highlighting the wedding couple.


CHANGE OF ADDRESS / MOVING

When moving within our area, please notify the church office to insure that we will maintain proper contact with you. Please also e-mail the church office (welsnovi@aol.com) when you change your e-mail, as this is the easiest way to pass along news to the congregation.

If you are moving to a distant area, please contact the church office to receive information on WELS or ELS churches in the area to which you are moving. You are encouraged to transfer your membership as soon as possible after you have moved so that your soul may continue to be comforted and your faith strengthened by word and sacrament. You may also locate the nearest WELS congregation through the church locator feature at www.wels.net.

COLLEGE BOUND

When it is time to go off to college, please contact the church office with information about your school address, phone number, e-mail, etc... We want to be sure that you do not feel forgotten while you are away at school. We also want to offer encouragement to attend the local WELS or ELS church that is closest to you. The information you send us will also be passed on to WELS Campus Ministry which will send you various mailings to encourage you to cling to your Savior in a potentially turbulent time in your life.



Please notify the pastor at times of extended illness or when hospitalized. Even if you think you are only going to be in the hospital for a few days for tests, he would appreciate knowing that. Hospitals do not notify the pastor if his members are admitted there. You are also invited to request the prayers of the congregation for yourself and other loved ones who are ill, hospitalized, or in special need.

SHUT-IN

If you are confined to your home or live in a nursing home, the pastor is eager and willing to call on you to proclaim the gospel and administer Lord's Supper. Normally, monthly calls are made. Other visits are made as people indicate the desire or need. If you are shut-in, you can hear a confessional Lutheran service at AM 1500, WLQV, on Sunday mornings, 10:30 - 11:00 AM. Shut-ins may receive a video tape of Good Shepherd's Sunday service upon request.

DEATH & BURIAL

The church is a most appropriate place for the celebration of the resurrection which is ours through Jesus Christ. This celebration also takes place when a Christian dies. Although we grieve, we do not grieve like the rest of men who have no hope. By a Christian burial, we confess our faith and express our hope in the resurrection to life everlasting for those who die in Christ. A Christian funeral rightly keeps our focus on Christ crucified and risen rather than on the individual who died. While many people may want to offer kind words of comfort, encouragement, and sympathy, we have no real comfort apart from the gospel of Jesus Christ. Our desire is that all who grieve might be comforted by the promises which sustained our departed saint throughout his / her life and even unto death. Various testimonies, poems, or speeches are best reserved for gatherings outside of the church. The church is the place for the promises of Christ to be heard; and only these promises guarantee eternal life.



The same practice is true for the grave side service, where we commit the body to the ground in the confidence of its resurrection from the grave to eternal life. The focus rightly remains on Christ and his promises. In the event that a military honor guard is present, they may function following the benediction.

SPECIAL PRAYERS

At all important events in your life, whether times of joy and celebration or times of sorrow and crisis, you are invited to request the prayers of the congregation. Your brothers and sisters in Christ, then, have the opportunity to rejoice with those who rejoice and to mourn with those who mourn. They can also carry your praises or your needs before the throne of God, heeding the words of St. Paul, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way, you will fulfill the law of Christ." (Galatians 6:2)

PRIVATE ABSOLUTION



"If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:8,9) With these words, our Lord encourages us not to conceal, but to confess our sins. With confession, there is the promise of forgiveness. While we have a general confession in each Divine Service, God's people may also receive Private Absolution from their pastor. We follow a printed rite, in which the penitent confesses his / her sinfulness with an opportunity to confess a sin or sins which are particularly troubling. The penitent come seeking forgiveness. The pastor, speaking for Christ, proclaims, "I forgive you" – a proclamation which is as valid and certain as if Christ himself said it (John 20:23). As the rite suggests, all that is confessed remains private. The pastor has no right to divulge anything; for the confession was not made to the pastor, but to Christ. Likewise, the absolution is not the pastor's, but Christ's.

If the pastor feels unqualified to assist in a particular case, he can assist you in finding a qualified professional counselor. All matters in pastoral counseling are kept confidential.
